COURSE DESCRIPTION:

International political economy (IPE) is a study that synthesizes methods and theories of economics, politics, and sociology to study international problems. The course critically examines the relationships between wealth and power in the global economy. The course uses an institutional perspective to study political economy through five IPE structures — production, trade, finance, security, and knowledge.

COURSE OBJECTIVES:

- 1. To examine the interactions between international economics and international politics.
- 2. To understand the relationship between power and wealth in the world from a critical perspective.
- 3. To examine various international political economic structures: production, trade, finance, global security, and knowledge.
- 4. To demonstrate critical thinking by researching a current issue from an IPE perspective.

I. Timed Short (non-comprehensive) Tests:

These (three in total) will be administered at the end of Week 3, Week 6, and then during Finals week. These are going to be non-comprehensive and open book and will be dropped on a Saturday. Do note that you only have only two hours to submit the test as you can take the test **one time** during a 24-hour window.

II. Discussions:

There will be a requirement to post answers to weekly discussions on the readings and posted articles. For discussion etiquette, please see the document titled, "Class Participation and Discussions: Please READ" located in the course's General Information Module (on the Main Page). The "Discussion Rubric" is also contained in the same module. In general, I grade these posts less on accuracy and more on effort. That said, I will grade down for consistently low-quality work and/or any inappropriate posts (such as being disrespectful, inappropriate, etc). I will provide a detailed prompt/question each week. For full credit each week you must post your response by Friday and respond to your peers by the Sunday of that week.

III. NGO Report:

You have to submit a 4-5-page (double-spaced) report.

- 2. Demonstrate how **states**, **markets**, **and societies interact over this issue**. How hard is it to determine the analytical boundaries between the state, market, and society in this cas e?
- 3. Find an NGO that is working in the issue space using this interactive map- https://glob_alwa.org/our-members/member-map/.

- 4. Which region of the world does your NGO focus on and why? Here you will have to g ive me some data, tables, graphs etc. that demonstrate context and tell me why the issue matters to the NGO.
- 5. Can you support the NGO's research by providing recent literature on the issue? Here I would need at least four papers summarized and cited.
- 6. Is your NGO aware of new research in the field? From a critical review of the NGOs website, do you have any advice for the NGO based on your classroom knowledge
